Wildlife bridge: In Agoura Hills, California (U.S.), a unique overpass built for animals is reshaping how roads and wild-lands coexist. Stretching above a major freeway, the structure is carefully designed with native soil, plants, and fungi to resemble the surrounding hills. Every detail, from seed collection to the rerouting of water and power lines beneath the road, supports the goal of blending nature with infrastructure. The crossing will connect fragmented habitats, offering a safe passage for species that once roamed freely. Native shrubs and trees will eventually turn the bridge into a living extension of the land itself. Rather than block movement, the freeway will become part of a larger, greener path forward.

Code access: In Abuja, Nigeria, a small group of students watch as their instructor signs instructions beside a screen of glowing code. This classroom is part of Deaf-in-Tech, a training program giving individuals with hearing loss the tools to succeed in the country's fast-growing tech field. Lessons are led entirely through sign language, making complex digital skills accessible to those often left out. With mentorship, laptops, and career support included, students learn everything from data tools to programming. More than education, the goal is transformation. As technology continues to expand, this effort ensures that inclusion isn't an afterthought. One line of code at a time, barriers are being rewritten.

Glacier escape: In Iceland, guests can now sleep beside drifting icebergs in a transparent dome on water. Tucked away on Fjallsárlón Glacier Lagoon, the Aurora Hut offers a one-of-a-kind floating retreat complete with a bed, heat, bathroom, and views that stretch from glacial peaks to a sky full of stars. Accessed by zodiac boat, each hut is spaced out for privacy and rests silently in one of Iceland's most breathtaking settings. From within the glass ceiling, guests can watch northern lights ripple above or a sunrise light the nearby mountains. It's a rare chance to merge glacier exploration and overnight stay into one unforgettable moment. For those tired of hotels, it's a room that floats with the rhythm of the wild.

Mirror wonder: In Mount Tremper, New York (U.S.), an old grain silo unexpectedly hides a towering kaleidoscope that turns light and mirrors into a swirling spectacle. Visitors recline beneath a mirrored pyramid as shifting images flicker across a massive 60-foot (15.2 m) dome, creating the illusion of endless motion. Originally designed by a psychedelic artist, the show blends color, sound, and movement into a short, immersive journey. Nearby, collectors browse one-of-a-kind kaleidoscopes, some crafted from stained glass or gemstone. The main attraction still draws crowds, especially those curious to see what it feels like to step inside a dream.

Cream Cheese, softened 2 (8 ounce) packages BAKER'S

1 (8 ounce) package PHILADELPHIA -Sweet Baking Chocolate, melted Crush 9 of the cookies to fine crumbs in food processor, reserve for later use. (Cookies can also be finely crushed in a resealable plastic bag using a rolling pin.) Crush remaining 36 cookies to fine crumbs; place in medium bowl. Add cream cheese; mix until well blended. Roll cookie mixture into 42 balls, about

Dip balls in chocolate; place on wax paper-covered baking sheet. (Any leftover chocolate can be stored at room temperature for another use.) Sprinkle with reserved cookie crumbs.
